Facts and figures

"Local municipalities should get the director's role because initiatives are not connected"

- 1. 1500 applications per month in Belgium
- 2. Most refugees (60%- 35%) come from Syrië, Afghanistan and Irak (most other applicants are marriage migrants)
- 3. 50,5 % get a (temporary) protection
- 4. 2000 decisions are being made per month
- 5. AN asylum seeker can start an integration path after four months
- 6. Recognized refugees have to take this course
- 7. 76% of refugees are male
- 8. 91% of local municipalities help refugees to feel welcome, to housing and to information about the job market
- 9. Refugees are 0,36% of the Belgian population, 0,56% of the active population
- 10. Employment rate of refugees is 30% lower than indigenous people
